Here is some information about the priorities that were previously determined for your neighbourhood and information about what action has been taken about these:

You said: You were concerned about anti-social behaviour in the town.

We did: We have had a lot of success in relation to Acceptable Behaviour Contracts (ABCs) and Anti-Social Behaviour Orders (ASBOs) on various juveniles in Portchester. We are continuing to keep up the pressure and various sanctions are in place on several youths.

We continue to work closely with Fareham Borough Council's community safety team and additional ABCs are being drawn up to be used to curb unruly behaviour. We continue to patrol potential anti-social behaviour hot-spot areas; namely the community centre car park and grounds, the precinct, the castle and Wicor recreation ground.

You said: You were concerned about the levels of marine crime.

We did: Consequently we have developed a web site: www.hampshirermainewatch.co.uk. This site is extremely important and provides reassurance for the marine community and improves confidence in policing the marine environment.

You said: Develop No Cold Calling Zones and communicate with residents.

We did: The development of these zones is ongoing. Please refer to our web page at www.hampshire.police.uk for updates on this matter.

JUSTICE SEEN JUSTICE DONE

The following is information about what has been done to bring offenders to justice in your area recently:

Sergeant Tremellen is in charge of the youth intervention clinic at the police station. Any youth that comes through the criminal justice system and can be dealt with other than by way of appearing in court is assessed and dealt with. This is especially useful for those who commit crime in Portchester, as we have first hand experience of who they are, what they have done and what measures can be put in place to prevent them re-offending.

Your Safer Neighbourhoods team is committed to reducing crime and making this community a safer and more secure place to live and work. PCs and PCSOs conduct regular daily patrols in the area, establishing and maintaining good relationships with local residents, and the partner agencies who work alongside the police in safeguarding the community's interests.

This high visibility policing deters criminals, and prevents activity such as anti-social behaviour, which can otherwise be a blight on a community if allowed to take place. Each and every criminal incident is investigated thoroughly by police, and we always seek to secure a charge and conviction. ASBOs (anti-social behaviour orders) and ABCs (acceptable behaviour contracts) are used whenever possible on

those people who continue to trouble the residents of the area with criminal and anti-social activity. Additionally, we are here to provide support to those unfortunate enough to become victims of crime, and we give crime prevention advice to help stop residents becoming victims in the first place.

The result of this commitment has seen crime fall across the entire policing area in which your community resides by over eight percent in the past year.

In more detail: Assaults have fallen by over two percent. Criminal damage has fallen by over 17 percent. Serious violent crime has fallen by over 13 percent. Serious acquisitive crime (burglaries, robberies etc.) have fallen by over six percent.

We will continue to work with partner agencies and with you, the residents of our area, to make sure that these falls in crime continue through the rest of 2010 and onwards.
